CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT

After 29 years as President the time came to move on from this role to both position us for the future and for an orderly changing of the guard. This fulfils a longer term view that was built into our structure at the previous AGM to split the role of President to President & Chairperson. Briefly, I would like to reflect on where we have come from over the past 30 years in the context of our volunteers who have contributed so much to making us who we are and what this means for our future. I would also like to welcome Andrew Miedler as our new President who I know will do a magnificent job.

There have been many achievements but the standout ones are:

- In 1985/86 we had 18 teams (8 Seniors and 10 Juniors), no Kanga and no Girls cricket.
- Last season we had 43 teams (12 Seniors and 31 Juniors), 103 Kanga and 41 Girls playing.
- Since Kanga was introduced in 1992/93, 2035 children have been introduced to a lifetime of cricket. Since being introduced in 1996/97, 595 Girls also have played with our club.
- Our local brand and the relationship with the schools in our catchment area is strong and this has sustained us despite an ageing demographic and changing mix.
- Our long term relationship with the WPH Sports Club is also worthy of special mention. Our relationship goes back over 50 years and today remains extremely strong.
- Our achievements have not been by chance. It is the result of a strategy implemented by our wonderful volunteers.
- Finally, to see our A1 side win a Club record 4th consecutive premiership last season was very satisfying. For this side to comprise 9 players who graduated from our Juniors, many of whom had come through from Kanga is exciting.

To recap on last season, mention must be made of the death of Philip Hughes. This had a national impact. For our Club it also hit hard. Our Photo Gallery has a number of shots showing how our members marked this tragic event from Kanga to A1. To see every team though observe a minute's silence, wear black arm bands and do a number of other team specific remembrances was very special.

On the field, it was again pleasing to see so few issues on and off the field and those that did pop up were resolved quickly.

Finally, I would like to outline some highlights:

Volunteers

I would again like to make a special mention to our volunteers. This season we had over 200 volunteers involved in running our Club – our Executive leadership team, coaches, managers, gear stewards, umpires, scorers. Add to this our parents who come along to support their children is outstanding.

Pink Stumps Day

Over the last few years our U9s have run our Pink Stumps Day fund raising for this great cause. This year Joseph Cooray and his U9 parents raised an impressive \$6,800 for the McGrath Foundation. Thank you to Joseph and his team of helpers on making a difference.

WPH Sports Club

We have a great relationship with the WPH Sports Club. Apart from being valued sponsors, this is a relationship that continues to strengthen over the years. Our appreciation and thanks go to the Directors, CEO Jason Read, his staff and everyone at the Sports Club.

Community support

In addition to our annual McGrath Foundation support, this season we established a relationship with the All Abilities Program to provide cricketing opportunity for those young people in our community who love cricket and have a disability. Working with All Abilities NSW we started a program at Edward Bennett Oval in conjunction with the T20 Blast and from a small base of 4 people we have the potential to continue this association.

<u>Chairman (President's Award – Jim Fuggle Trophy)</u>

Roger Friend is this season's winner. Roger has captained many seniors teams since joining us in 1996/97 but he has also contributed much more behind the scenes which has led to this award. Roger is also our Seniors Registrar - a role making sure that every player is correctly registered and plays in the right grade. Roger also represents us on the Association's Senior Competition Committee. Finally, Roger had major hip surgery this season and was still processing registrations just days into his recovery. Thanks for your efforts Roger.

Next season we move into our 85th year with a high level of confidence that 2015/16 will be another very good season.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

At our last Annual General Meeting it was decided to split the role of Chairperson / President as a step towards a gradual succession plan. I am thrilled to have the opportunity to be President of this great Club and to help guide us to a sustainable future.

I would like to call out the amazing contribution that Barry has made in his 30 years of leadership. Our Club is in great shape and is acknowledged as a leading example of a successful club. This has been achieved by our wonderful volunteers over many years but has been achieved under great leadership by Barry. Thank you Barry.

Briefly, a bit about my background. I have been involved in WPHCCC for over 15 years starting with children playing Kanga then through Juniors and now Seniors. I have also been President of the Westbrook AFL Club and have a passion for the role that organised sport plays in our community.

This season has seen many highlights:

- One of the things that differentiates us from others is our policy of 'Participation over Results' for our Junior players. This was redefined this season by Julian Bish to reflect years of what has worked and what hasn't and has been well received.
- While we didn't win any Junior Premierships, not that this is what we define as success in any event, the numbers of children transitioning from Kanga to our Juniors is a good sign for our future. This season we had 16 teams from the U8s to U10s with 6 teams in each of the U9s and U10s.
- Graham Chivers has done an amazing job with the Girls. Working closely with CNSW in a partnership relationship, Graham established both T20 Blast for Girls aged 8 to 12 years (32 participants) and a team in the new CNSW Breakers Junior Cricket League. Well done Graham.
- We have also made a number of Grand Finals and won a number of Premierships:
 - o Our Girls won the inaugural Junior Breakers League Spring Season Competition as undefeated champions
 - o Our Juniors participated in 2 Grand Finals U13 White and U12 Blue and just missed out
 - o In Seniors we had a record 9 teams in the Semi Finals, 8 in the Grand Final and 4 Premiers including A1 winning a club record 4th consecutive Rofe Shield.

A special mention to our A1 Grade side who won a Club record 4th straight Rofe Shield in convincing style. Apart from being a Club record for consecutive wins in this grade, equally important was the way that they won. The boys won with grace and with impeccable behaviour in at times challenging circumstances. At the end of the game, even the Umpires noted the professionalism, conduct and performance of our team.

Our future

The season past has been outstanding from many respects. The future also offers many opportunities and challenges to build on our great history. Our on-field and off-field success over many years does not just happen. Our volunteers do an amazing job and we can't survive without these very generous contributions. We need to continue driving our future and refining the strategy.

We have completed a detailed demographic analysis and this shows that our population is ageing and that the socio mix is also evolving to a more diverse community. We have developed a comprehensive strategy to identify our strengths and weaknesses and this will be finalised before the start of next season.

Next season is our 85th year as a Cricket Club and this is an impressive achievement. We are looking forward to another great season.

- 12 Senior Teams

All up this is approximately 710 registered players.

JUNIORS' REPORT

In March this year we capped off another great season for our juniors, and the 85th season for our club at large.

We again fielded 31 teams across all age groups from Under 8s through to Under 16s. Particularly pleasing was that we fielded a massive 10 teams in Under 8s and Under 9s alone. The fact that so many of our Kanga graduates are moving into junior teams is testament to the success of our long-running Kanga program.

Our club's "participation over results" policy has been a long-standing point of differentiation in our junior club. This season the Junior Committee, with assistance from the club's Executive Committee, met to put this policy under the spotlight and to debate and define precisely what we mean by 'Participation Over Results'. The result is the definition below, which has been embraced by the club.

Participation Over Results.

WPHCCC has a long-standing policy of Participation Over Results. This policy is about providing opportunities for ALL players to participate and contribute in matches, as well as providing a positive and encouraging environment for all. This makes for a healthy 'team culture' and helps us to retain players year to year, a record our club is very proud of. This policy does not necessarily require coaches to evenly allocate overs to all bowlers nor to systematically rotate the batting order in every match, although this is an option that has been used successfully in past seasons. It is acknowledged that every team is unique. Every player has their own unique skill level, abilities, confidence level and their own personal goals. Therefore the coach needs to use their judgment and knowledge of the players and parents to provide opportunities for all players to participate, and to develop their skills over the course of the season. Many factors need to be considered, including player safety, player ability, confidence levels, the abilities of the opposition, player availability, ambitions and goals of players and parents. Of course our Club wants to be competitive and to celebrate personal and team achievements - but not at the expense of providing an inclusive and supportive environment for all our players. We judge success by the number of children who want to back-up the next season.

Rather than a 'policy' I prefer to think of it as our 'ethos'. The core message is that we want to ensure equal opportunities for all our junior players.

Sadly we did not win any premierships this season, but I congratulate our six junior teams who made it to semi finals and our U12 Blue and U13 White teams, both of whom made it to their Grand Finals.

We measure success not by premierships, but by retention of our junior players year to year. This year 10 of our Under 16 players were awarded the Arthur Souter trophy. This recognizes junior players who have played continuously with WPHCCC from Kangas right through to Under 16s. That means the vast majority of our U16 players this season have played together with our club for at least nine years!

There were some outstanding individual performances within our junior ranks this season including Ritesh Manocha (U11 Blue) and Daniel Piccione (U10 Purple) who both got hat-tricks, and Harrison Broughton (U16 Red) who scored 100 not out against Castle Hill RSL.

Country Carnivals

Each year our club is invited to send teams to various country rep carnivals. We are the only club invited to do so – and so this represents a unique opportunity for players at WPHCCC.

I can say from experience these carnivals are a fantastic experience, not only for the players but for their families and supporters who come along for a week of fun.

This season Brendan Harkin, Brendan Flynn and Andrew Rickard each led a team of U14s, U15s and U16s respectively to Tamworth, Armidale and Taree.

Decked out in specially made WPHCCC touring shirts the teams had a great time playing on turf at some picturesque country ovals against very good rep teams from around the state. Please see the separate reports in the book.

Pink Stumps Day

In February this year our Under 9 teams and parents held a Pink Stumps Day fundraiser at Cherrybrook Public School to raise money for the McGrath Foundation. Led by Joseph Cooray and his team of volunteers they managed to raise a staggering \$6,800 for this terrific cause. Well done to all involved and to all those who came along and supported the cause.

What started five years ago as an initiative from one of our junior teams has now grown into an annual event for our Under 9s. Over the past five years we have raised well over \$20,000 for this cause. Please see Joseph's report later in the book.

<u>Juniors to Seniors</u>

This season we had many of our older junior players filling in for senior teams on a regular basis. This is a win-win as it helps out our senior teams who may be short players, it also provides important experience for our juniors to play Saturday afternoons in a different environment and provides a pathway for junior players who want to continue playing beyond Under 16s.

This is an initiative we will be embracing further next season, in consultation with our Senior captains.

Junior Coaching Sessions

This season we internalized the age group coaching sessions that were previously provided by SportsPro. Stuart Newman led these sessions supported by a team of young coaches. The feedback to this has been very positive and this is an initiative we will build upon in 2015-16.

Perpetual Trophies

Two of our major trophies presented each year to junior players are the John Coulthard Trophy (for Junior player of the year) and the Charles Booth Memorial Trophy which is award to an U13 player who not only demonstrates skills on the field but importantly plays in the true spirit of the game.

Congratulations to Kyle Faber who received the John Coulthard Trophy this year. Not only did Kyle accumulate impressive statistics throughout the season but he has continually participated in representative cricket, attended all three country carnivals (Tamworth, Armidale and Taree) and regularly played seniors in B2 grade. To top it off he demonstrates great leadership and sportsmanship and is a terrific guy. Well done Kyle!

Connor Hindmarch received the Charles Booth Trophy. All of us who know Connor know him to be a delightful young man who is mature beyond his years. This excerpt from one of several nominations Connor received sums it up best ... "Connor sets a very high standard of excellence and his actions are a great example for all to follow. In my opinion, Connor is the true essence of the "spirit of cricket".

JUNIOR GIRLS REPORT

What a very exciting year it has been for Girls cricket at WPHCCC. To be launched into my new role was quite daunting and I set myself some big targets. I learned early on that we usually played short last season and clearly needed to sort this out in order to move forwards.

When I took over running the Girls cricket in June we had just 4 returning players from the previous season. Little did I dream how things would work out this season.

The NSGCA was being wound up and Girls cricket in future would be run by Cricket NSW. A new competition was born as the Breakers Junior Cricket League. We were fortunate to attract some new players and eventually managed a squad of nine girls keen to play, ranging in age from 10 to 15. I did have some concerns about the wide age range especially when we played against teams all aged 15 or 16.

The Spring competition involved ten teams and our girls won all 8 of their matches to secure the first ever Breakers Junior Cricket League Spring competition and the girls had the thrill of being presented with their medals by the NSW Breakers team at the SCG.



Jenny's powerful batting at the top of the order got us off to fast starts most weeks and Darshana, Christina and Jae showed skill, experience and determination in pushing our scores up each week. We had the joy of Khushi's first season of cricket with balls being smashed in all directions and always providing great theatre for the keen supporters and Ellen enjoying success in her first season too. Minoli and Danielle finished joint second leading wicket takers in the whole competition and our pace attack of Anushka and Darshana was enough to scare most opening batters into submission.

We were fortunate to add a tenth player in Zoya to the squad during the Christmas break and headed into the Summer competition with excitement. Sadly we were soundly beaten by our local rivals (Castle Hill) in the round robin matches but we bounced back in style to finish 2nd on the ladder with Anushka excelling with the ball and Zoya having a great start to her cricketing life with runs and wickets. We again played Castle Hill in the Semi Final and sadly got the wrong side of a very close game to finish the season.



Special thanks to Mal Hall who ran the team on match days allowing me to be a cricketing Dad for a change, and to Michelle for her wonderful scoring duties each week. Our enthusiastic supporters turned up each week cheering on the girls and we wound up the season with a pool party at our house which was great fun.

We also started a T20 Blast on Friday nights to attract the 8 to 12 year old girls into playing cricket and managed to get 32 signed up for the first session before Christmas. To watch 2 games being played at the same time at Edward Bennett Oval each Friday was great fun and due to popular demand we continued with a second series of 6 weeks after Christmas too. Watching the girls run to the oval each week looking forward to their cricket was very rewarding indeed. The spectators were treated to music and dancing throughout the games, providing some unusual cricketing techniques with run ups incorporating dance moves and sometimes cartwheels were performed while chasing balls to the boundary.



We ran a sausage sizzle each week and were delighted to raise and contribute \$380 to the Pink Stumps efforts from the girls section.



The T20 Girls were treated to some wonderful opportunities by Cricket NSW. Many of them took part in the Anthem Ceremony when the Southern Stars played the West Indies at North Sydney Oval, they played in the break between the Women's and Men's T20 matches at ANZ Stadium and then on the outfield at the SCG on Day 4 of the Test Match. Some even featured in an article on Backyard cricket in the Sydney Morning Herald.

Hopefully all of the girls will be looking forward to returning next season to T20 Blast and also some of the older ones will be joining the Breakers Juniors squads too

We have formed a Girls Committee and my thanks to Mal, Michelle, Jae, Kirsty and Sarah for standing. We are all looking forward to working hard to grow from the success we have achieved this year with planning already underway.

Our aim for next season is to run the hugely successful T20 Blast on Friday nights which has created a complete pathway for the girls who play Kanga to progress through to joining a Junior Breakers team and perhaps beyond. Certainly it would be great to get two Saturday teams for next season.

My thanks as well to Edwina Chappell who ran the girls previously. The handover was smooth and I would like to place on record my thanks for Edwina's work with the girls section in laying the foundation of what we have managed to achieve this season.



We lost the toss and were asked to bowl on a rock hard Asquith Park wicket. The day couldn't have started any better when on the first ball of the match, Spaldo in his final A1 grade game produced an absolute gem of a delivery smashing into off-stump.

This was a sign of things to come and the guys showed why we have the best bowling attack in the comp. Steady wickets flowed all morning with some tremendous pressure through bowling partnerships. Jobbo (2/15); Riley Miedler once again backing up from 6fa in the SF picked up (3/13 and his 200th wicket making him the youngest in our history to achieve this landmark); Hendo the finals specialist grabbed (3/10) and Sol got an important wicket also (1/15). Berowra all out just after lunch for 6 after being 9/48 at lunch. This total is identical to what we bowled ARL out for in last year's GF.

In reply we were able to reach 4-130 at stumps. Our top order was all class and really showed that if you dig in and value your wicket on this pitch, it would pay dividends. Gav Taylor (52*) and Stu Newman (43) were outstanding as they have been all season. With still 6 wickets left and plenty of batting to come we are in a superb position to bring home Rofie for a fourth straight year.

Day 2

Day 1

A huge weekend for the A2 boys. After a comprehensive outright win over the minor premiers in the semi-final we were very confident going into the Final against the defending premiers. Winning the toss, our Captain Julian Raffel put Berowra into bat signaling our aggressive intent and it proved correct with our strike bowler Tim Scoular taking a wicket in the first over. In tandem with Rowan Keating we strangled the opposition to only 2-24 from the first 11 overs due to extreme pace from both bowlers. On came Luke Herzog who particularly enjoys playing Berowra and he took two wickets in his first over to leave the opposition reeling at 4-25, and then later staggering at 6-45.

Our batting order was well established and everyone knew the job they had to do, so despite an early hiccup Phil Wurth and Alex Connell got us to a solid foundation of 50 for the second wicket. Nick Bennett (20) then came on and shared in a critical 47 run partnership with Phil in a terrific display of batting by Nick. At this stage Phil was 67no with 11 boundaries as opener and was proving insurmountable. Then in came Josh Mathias, an elite young player who excelled on the big stage, brutalizing the self hyped Berowra attack during his innings of 38 (with 6 fours and 1 six and 0 singles).

Joshy was sensational and his 64 run partnership with Phil got us the first innings lead and continued to build on the aggressive platform we had set with our batting. The next achievement was a personal one, and it was with tremendous cheer and camaraderie that the boys celebrated Phil Wurth's maiden A2 century, made all the more special being in a Grand Final. Phil was eventually dismissed on the last ball of the day, but his innings of 109 (with 15 fours and 1 six) during an occupation of 48 overs was an incredible display of leadership, maturity, courage and was an inspiration for the rest of the team. Day two

With Jimmy already established on 15no from the previous day he continued the aggression with a terrific innings of 31 (5 fours), sharing in partnerships that added 75 runs to the total, a great effort from our Vice Captain. Thereafter we simply wanted to soak up some overs and add runs, and Cam Cleary enjoyed some time in the middle in a partnership that added 21 runs for the ninth wicket, and Luke Herzog also had a flash and hit a couple of boundaries in a partnership that added 19 for the last wicket. We were eventually dismissed for 275 with our Captain Julian Raffel not out on 31 (4 fours) after a gutsy display that also shared in partnerships that added 75 runs to our total, a great effort from out Skipper. This was our highest total for the season and again was a near perfect display of aggressive intent and determination.

Having to overcome a 131 run deficit, Berowra had a quick hit-out before the lunch break. Coming back out we decided to turn the tables on them and also attack, symbolic of everything we did during the entire season. Plans were set and the boys went out to their fielding positions full of confidence.

Starting with spin immediately threw the opposition into disarray, and Rowan Keating in an incredible effort created a fantastic run out on the first ball after lunch that set the tone for the rest of the innings. With Tim Starr missing Day One he was set for a massive contribution and took a wicket in his first over. With Berowra losing two wickets in six balls, the momentum was completely with our A2 boys. With Starr spinning at one end and Tim Scoular bowling supreme pace at the other, it was only a matter of time before

the end. We eventually dismissed the opposition for 105, with Tim Starr finishing with 4-36 from eight quality overs, and Tim Scoular finished with 5-52 from 10 overs to give him match figures of 10-109, an incredible individual effort that further proved why he was the best bowler in the competition. With some incredible catches to Josh Mathias in slips, an outrageous catch in the deep to Jimmy McBrien and great individual efforts in the field by Tim Starr, Rowan Keating, Nick Bennett (who had an incredible finals series behind the stumps), and Alex Connell (who was applauded by the opposition crowd after putting his body on the line in deep that epitomized the determination of this squad), we were brilliant in the field. With Tim Scoular fittingly taking the final wicket, the boys finished the season as 2014/2015 A2 Premiers after winning by an innings and 26 runs, an epic performance.

There are always pivotal moments in finals that determine the outcome – over two days our A2 boys produced many that are too numerous to write here, but special mention must go to Tim Scoular and Phil Wurth who put in heroic performances (and uniquely shared the number 109 in this game), ones that will be forever remembered by their teammates. All the boys were superb, and to win both finals outright and to win a Premiership from fourth spot is an incredible achievement. A sensational performance by all the XI on the field during the Final, and special mention to Simon Smyth, Allan Raffel and Cameron McBrien who were integral members of the squad and also share in this success.

To be able to have the opportunity to run Kanga introduction sessions during school periods adds tremendous value in introducing children to cricket and building on the strong relationship we have had with these schools for a number of years.

For many of our children and Parents this was their first taste of cricket and in many cases it would have been the first experience of cricket for many our parents and extended family. We had approx. 12 of our parents come along to our Level 0 coaching program and this gave our new Coaches and Managers the introduction needed to run their Teams. It was great to see all games run like clockwork with lots of involvement from parents and supporters. The sessions each week were a lot of fun and it was great to see the children and family support back up right until the end.

Season's end saw the madcap skills event spilling over the entire Edward Bennett Oval followed by the distribution of trophies, team photos and, of course, Pat's traditional bags of lollies for all. Even during his health problems Pat did not forget that!

Thank you again to everyone involved in making the season such a success. We are looking forward to another big season in 2015/16.

Dylan H's keeping was always of a high standard but his skills improved exponentially throughout the season and was without doubt one of the best keepers in the comp by season's end.
