CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT

Not since the war years (1942-45) when competition was suspended, have we seen a season like 2019/20 (our 89th season). It will be remembered more for what happened off the field than on it. A couple of messages from the Association captures the significance of these events:

"Hornsby Council have closed the majority of their grounds. From their Facebook page:

'Catastrophic fire conditions are forecast for Hornsby Shire for tomorrow Saturday 21 December and, as a precautionary measure, all Council facilities located within bushfire-prone areas will be closed for the day.'

With the weather forecast for Hills area at 43-44 degrees, combined with the forecast air quality index of very poor to hazardous, the Senior Competition Committee have decided to cancel play." (Friday, 20 December 2019).

And also:

"On the basis of Cricket Australia and Cricket NSW's strong recommendations, and in the interests of player, official and community health and safety, all 2019/20 Senior Grand Finals are cancelled, and the highest placed teams have been awarded premiers. Refer to the links below for details of CA and CNSW announcements (Wednesday 18 March 2020).

The Reports of my colleagues will address the operational implications of these events and my focus will be on the good work that has been done this season.

Achievements

Given the circumstances of this season, I would though like to touch on the main achievements.

On the field we have seen a lot of changes – a new Constitution that was unchanged since 1994 and no longer reflected regulatory changes over the last 26 years. This is a bit like house insurance – you don't need it until you need it.

Other changes included the implementation of a new MyCricket Registration system, a number of exciting Girls initiatives from CNSW (Girls only Master Blasters & Women's Social Cricket), extended pathways approach in Junior Boys, adoption of Junior Blasters in place of Kanga and the rapid growth of Blowfly Cricket.

Add to this the busy Association leadership roles that Andrew (Association President) and Rob (Juniors Secretary) have taken on for a 2nd season, the cancellation due to bushfires and drought of 2 of our 3 Country Carnivals plus a number of new ExCo members with Suzanna and Grant Colburt (Girls) and Rick Turner (Seniors). Let us not forget Bill Peterkin as he and Bec also had twins born during the season.

All this on top of a Club with almost 800 players, plus, of course, day jobs to manage, you start to get a feel for what we have collectively been managing.

The results have been extraordinary with a season that has pretty much been 'event' free. At Association level, to see the lack of dysfunction that has been made an art form over the previous 10 years plus the acceptance of change rather than open and covert hostility is a credit to Andrew and Rob – it has been a textbook approach to bringing people along on the journey.

Vale Wally Howard

It is with sadness that one of our Life Members passed away on Christmas Eve (24th December 2019). Wally Howard was one our founding fathers and was our 7th Life Member. So, much of what we take for granted in our great Club can be owed to Wally. He is also the older brother of our former Prime Minister, John Howard.

As an administrator, Wally was our 1st Club President and then again between 1969 and 1971. Life Membership recognised his role in developing our Juniors and re-establishing our Club after cricket stopped during the War Years (1942-45).

As a player, Wally played between 1960/61 to 1974/75, playing A1, A2 and B1. He scored 1,408 runs at 12.2 but it was as a bowler that he was most dominant. He took 342 wickets @ 16.6 with his off-spin bowling – the 10th highest aggregate in our history.

Our thoughts are with Wally's surviving family and remember that much of what we all enjoy in our Club can be traced back to Wally's vision and leadership.

A final thought

As we go to print with this Annual Report there is much that is unknown. We don't yet know if the season will start on time and the implications for our Schools programs. If we do start on time what impact will there be on winter sporting codes wanting to extend into the cricket season placing pressure on grounds and conflicting sporting commitments for our players. Further, we know that many of our families have experienced loss of jobs and have great uncertainty – all of which will affect the next season – in ways as yet unknown.

While we don't know what we don't know, we are planning around various scenarios to be as well prepared as we can be, given the circumstances.

With all this uncertainty we know almost everyone in our Club will be feeling at least a little uncomfortable or concerned and are increasingly uncertain about the future. Our daily actions and ordinary lives are highly disrupted, and it is not easy. However, we are amongst the lucky ones – we belong to an organisation that cares about its people.

As a community service organisation, our Club is here to play its role, to help you see-through the current situation and later, to make life fun and enjoyable again when cricket recommences on the other side. The future, with all its uncertainty – good and bad - is what makes life so interesting. Embrace it if you can – good will emerge from current difficulties.

Your friends at a Club like West Penno are true friends. In Kerry O'Keefe's biography he regrets not understanding the quality of the friendships from his club (St George). As an older man, he realised the bonds formed in the game and the quality of the people in it. He would tell us now – appreciate your teammates and Club.

Once we manage the health threat through everyone playing their part, we can begin to get to work on our cricket again and can look forward to season 2020/21.

Take care of yourselves, and best wishes to you and your family and friends in these trying times.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

2019/2020 - the season that was

The season started with the Seniors T20 matches on 14 September 2019, and no one could have predicted what was to follow. This has been a remarkable season that we have not seen the like of since 1942 when no cricket was played until 1946 due to WW2. Pause, for a moment, to reflect on what we have experienced since December 2019:

- Grounds closed for 'catastrophic fire conditions & poor air quality' (21 December)
- Tamworth (U14s) and Stan Austin Cup Taree (16s) cancelled due to drought
- Round washed out (18 January)
- Extreme heat cancellations (1 February)
- Washed out (8 February)
- Semi-Finals rain affected (14 March)
- Grand Finals cancelled due to COVID 19 (21 & 22 March)
- Juniors Presentation cancelled (21 March)
- Junior Rep trials postponed (29 March)
- Seniors Presentation cancelled (1 May)

As Barry comments in his Report, these are difficult times, but we will move on and cricket will again figure prominently. Let's then focus on our on-field achievements and use this as a basis to look to the future.

The events listed above aside, 2019/20 was another great season:

- 799 unique registered players (a Club & Association record)
- 39 Junior Teams the record is 40 Teams in 2015/16 but is +4 on last season
- 5 Girls teams +2 on last season which is the highest number of Teams since 1999/2000
- 12 Senior Teams equal to our Team entrances in 2009/10 & 2011/12. It is also +1 on last season and is an Association record
- 98 Junior Blasters +25 on last season
- **Blowfly Cricket** approx. 20 participants

These achievements are each significant and none of these 'just happen' without considerable effort. Our Club has been successful for many years and the reasons are not hard to find. Our Volunteers are high quality and the depth of leadership capability at all levels puts us in a strong position. I would like to focus on a few areas in particular that shows the advances being made.

Blowfly cricket

Blowfly cricket completed its 2nd season and was a great success. Our Club remains the only cricket club in NSW to have a Blowfly Division. Starting with 6 people last season the numbers grew to over 20 people this season.

Every Friday at James Henty Oval our Blowfly cricketers and their supporters / carers came along and had fun. Our Coaches are Blowfly cricket graduates and as Mark Rushton says – the 'Uncoachables coaching the Uncoachables' and doing it well.

The driving force of Bill Peterkin along with his great supporters – Mike Kinchington (D2 Captain), Alex Robertson (A2), Bailey Miedler (A1) and Danielle Chivers (Girls) have done an outstanding job.

Girls & Women's cricket

When Graham Chivers moved on as our Girls Director this left a big hole to fill. Enter Grant and Suzanna Colburt who have built on the great legacy left by Graham.

In addition to our strong registrations we were an important part of the successful 'Girls Only' Master Blaster initiative plus we were strong supporters of the Women's Social Cricket initiative that was a tremendous success. At Club level, 10% of all Registrations are now Girls and Women. In Junior Blasters, 16% of total registrations are Girls. Our target is to grow this further.

I would also like to mention the innovation and support from Cricket NSW who have been strong supporters of the Association and our Club.

Danielle Chivers:

National winner, 'Young Community Leader of the Year' & CNSW 'Young Community Leader of the Year'

On 21 May 2020, Cricket Australia selected Dani Chivers as the national 'Young Community Leader of the Year'. Danielle topped the list ahead of 5 other State nominations making her the highest ranked Young Community Leader in Australia.

To reach this distinguished level, Cricket NSW announced (13 May 2020) that Danielle was named the Young Community Leader of the Year! Her achievements, among many, are:

- Dani is a key member of our Schools Clinic/ Coaching teams
- is actively involved in Blowfly Cricket
- Is a Coach in the HK&HDCA Coaching Program run by the legendary Bruce Wood
- Last season she won the Association Rookie Coach of the Year Award
- Her playing record is also outstanding. Playing cricket for our Sixers Girls Cricket League and won the prestigious Lisa Sthalekar Award as the outstanding Girls cricketer for 2019/20.

The prestigious 'A Sport for All' Awards run by Cricket Australia are the highest honour a volunteer can receive and Dani has taken out one of only 3 individual categories. We have over 275 active volunteers who all do an amazing job to support our Club and Dani is a great representative of what our club is all about.

Well done Dani – we are very proud of your achievements.

Community

Our relationship with local schools continues to strengthen. We are welcomed into the Schools to run Cricket Clinics and the importance of this relationship shows with 74 (78%) of our Junior Blasters coming from Cherrybrook Public, John Purchase, Oakhill Drive, St Agatha's and WPH Public Schools. Further, 76% of Master Blasters & 57% of U9s come from these Schools. Add to this the parents, Volunteers and future Club Leaders and the importance of this relationship is clear.

Club Survey

Every 2 years we run a survey across our Club. This season it was completed for Juniors (Girls & Boys), Junior Blasters and Academy. The results will be used to build on what we do well and improve what can be done better. At Club level, what we do well is creating a welcoming culture, Participation focus over winning at all costs (Participation over Results), quality of coaching and general organisation.

Areas we need to focus on include: consistency in the application of 'Participation over Results' policy, selections in certain grades being inconsistent with Club policy and a number of rule changes that are at Association / CNSW level. The detailed responses will be used as an important input into planning for next season.

President's Award – Rob Hanich (Volunteer of the Year)

We have over 275 active Volunteers with everyone making a significant contribution. To be acknowledged as the outstanding Volunteer of the Year is something special.

Outside Life Membership, the 'President's Award' is the most prestigious Award that is available in our Club. The Award acknowledges the most outstanding Volunteer effort for our Club over the last season, also taking into account long service and outstanding contribution.

Rob is Deputy Juniors Director, Club Vice President, Seniors D1 Captain. Add to this, Juniors Secretary of the Association for a 2nd season plus being a former Club Juniors Director (2016-19), Junior Coach and Age Convenor. These are amazing contributions not just for this season but over many years.

Club Awards

Cricket Australia – 'A Sport for All'

CNSW also advised that we had been selected by the Sydney Sixers Metro Community Cricket team for Community Cricket Club of the Year for the annual 'A Sport for All' Awards held by Cricket Australia. They commented that:

"WPHCCC has been a great example of bringing people of the community together. The Club has proven that hard work and great volunteers can achieve fantastic outcomes for the cricketing community! The Club encompasses a number of attributes that we believe contribute to what is a great cricket Club."

Cricket Australia announced at the end of May that Quinns Rock Cricket Club in Perth was the worthy winner of this Award but to be the NSW nomination for an Australian wide Award was a fantastic acknowledgement.

Community Sports Awards

Another great achievement was our Club being nominated by CNSW for the 2nd time in 3 years as the CNSW Nominee as Community Club of the Year. To get this nomination once is special, to be nominated by CNSW as the outstanding Community Cricket Club in NSW twice is amazing. A big thanks to all of our players, supporters, Coaches, Managers and volunteers who make these special awards possible.

Registrations

Team numbers were covered by Andrew in his report. This season, all Registrations were made through the MyCricket Registration portal. Players also needed to be registered to be covered by our insurance coverage, so they had a high level of accuracy. The number of 'unique' registrations finished at 799 players – exceeding our previous record of 725 last season. This excludes players in the Women's Social cricket and Blowfly cricket.

Also pleasing is that we had 74 Girls registered to play – approx. 10.0% of all Registrations. The effective number would be higher again once our Women's Social cricket and Blowfly cricket is included.

Girls only Clinics

"It was a pleasure to have coaches from WPHCCC at JPPS last week. Feedback from the teachers saw it as a valuable experience for not only the girls but for them when they teach cricket. It was well organised and effectively run. I thought you might like to check out some student responses that were posted in the newsletter. Here they are:

The girls' cricket clinic was on Friday in the first session. Coaches from West Pennant Hills Cricket Club taught us some fun cricket drills where you had to work as a team. So, we went through four fun activities. The first one worked on our bowling in a tip game. If someone got tipped, you'd high five them after you did a bowling action! The tippers worked as a team and so did the runners. The second game was two teams, throwing cricket balls at bigger balls, trying to get the bigger balls to the other teams' line. It taught us some throwing skills! The third game was to practice on our batting skills. Every bat we got a certain amount of points depending on how far we hit the ball. The last drill helped us with throwing as we tried throwing a ball at stumps after doing a challenge like throwing a ball from one hand to the other first. I'm sure most of the girls learnt a lot and had a great amount of fun. Thank you WPHCCC! I for one had a lot of fun and learnt a lot. It was a great opportunity to have.

Year 6 On Friday we participated in a girls' cricket program. We all loved going to each activity where the coaches were fun and nice and explained everything very clearly. We went through four activities and they all helped to improve our throwing, batting, bowling and catching skills. My favourite activity was the last one where there were relays with different warm-ups and then we had the opportunity to throw the ball to the stumps. I liked it because it was great to work in teams and run a lot. Some of the other activities included tip with bowling actions, focusing on over-arm throwing to hit larger balls, then batting and fielding to get points. Country Carnivals

Drought had a significant impact on the Country Carnivals this season. The Tamworth Carnival (U14s) and U16 Stan Austin (Taree) Carnival were cancelled for the first time due to drought. The official advice from the Manning Junior Cricket Association gives a great insight into the conditions our cricketing friends from the bush were experiencing:

"The Manning Junior Cricket Asoc. needs to apologize that due to the drought conditions on the Mid North Coast which are the worst we have experienced we need with great reluctance to cancel the Stan Austin Carnival for 2020.

The Mid North Coast Council have brought in level 4 water restrictions which bans use of water outside.

The lack of rain will not only hinder the preparation of turf wickets but also affecting the outfields, we have had to cancel the use of several grounds because of the dangerous condition of the outfields, one ground has cracks in it that a golf ball would easily go down.

The Armidale (Walter Taylor Shield) for the U15s did play. The drought was so tough that only 1 of 7 turf grounds were available and donated water was used to keep the remaining turf ground open.

A great result from this Carnival is that our Team made such an impact both on and off the field that the Armidale DCA is keen to establish an ongoing relationship with our Club. Another highlight was that our Team initiated and ran the Pink Stumps day fund raising effort for the Carnival.

On the field, we played 5 games, we won games against Northern Rivers & Ballina and lost to Hunter Valley, Armidale and Tamworth. Our top players were:

- Josh Kodituwakku 89 runs @ 29.67
- Danielle Chivers 5 wickets @ 7.40

Also significant was that Danielle Chivers (Girls U16s) was the first Girl in our history to Captain a Carnival Team, and did this superbly well.

Our new Constitution

On 20 November 2019, our new Constitution was approved which is a significant event in our History. The previous Constitution was the 'Model Form', adopted when we were Incorporated on 20 December 1993. Since then the amount of regulatory & social change has been significant. The new Constitution, largely written by Barry McDonald, gives us the safety net that whenever we need this protection, it is available to guide and protect future Committees.

The partnership was by Campbell Wallace with 176* & Matt Schwartzel 83*. For Campbell's ton. It is also the equal 12th highest score in our Seniors History. The highest score is 225 scored by Ken Smith in 1956/57. His score included 26 x 4s & 1 x 6.

The story behind the scenes is what makes this interesting.

An update from his Skipper, Phill Hando follows:

"This is Campbell's first season with WPHCCC and I didn't get him to play for his batting. He is actually a bowler but due to breaking his leg 6 or 8 weeks ago (a small fracture while in a hurdles race) I have put him at first slip and not let him bowl.

He volunteered to open the batting with Jack as no one else wanted to. He has played cricket for years with the school (had last season off to do athletics) and has never hit a 50.

Also hasn't played cricket for 2 years concentrating on Athletics for Kings

So the secret to success is to break your leg, not pick up a bat for 2 years, volunteer to open the batting because no one else wanted to, and go out and score 176* - sounds pretty easy actually.

I wish I could say I knew he was a batsman all along!"

- His average of 47.71 is 2nd only to Laurie Tuckerman (59.3) for players to have scored more than 2,000 runs

So by any measure, Andrew is up there with our highest achievers.

A special thanks to the Principals of our local schools for allowing us access to conduct these clinics. To be able to have the opportunity to run Cricket introduction sessions during school periods adds tremendous value in introducing children to cricket and building on the strong relationship we have had with these schools for a number of years.

For many of our children and parents this was their first taste of cricket. It was great to see all games run like clockwork with lots of involvement from parents and supporters. The sessions each week were a lot of fun and it was great to see the children and family support right until the end.

We changed things up a little and added in a couple of skills days which was extremely popular and will definitely return next season. The kids loved going from activity to activity and having the opportunity to learn from different coaches.

None of the amazing work that happens to facilitate Kanga would be at all possible without all the volunteers. This year we ended up having 8 coaches and Managers, a HUGE thank you to each and every one of you for giving up your time to help so many other kids out each and every Saturday, I know the kids all appreciate everything you have done for them.

The children enjoyed the season thoroughly and learnt everything they did because of you guys. It was very clear to see the skill levels from the start of the season to the final weeks had increased greatly. A big thank you to all the parents, your help and assistance made each week run much more smoothly

There are a few other people I must thank individually for all their help. Our Head Coach Dani Chivers who was always willing to help out and assist, watching you grow into the head coach role has been great to watch – The kids love having you around and hope we see you again next year. David Flook who looks after the entire club's gear during the off season - The Club is very lucky to have such a place to store all our gear. It was exciting for us to start the year with an additional girls team giving us; 2 Junior (under 13's) and 2 Senior (under 17's) teams - many thanks to those who recruited their friends, cousins and acquaintances to join our club. This season we were able to play other Girls teams from Castle Hill, Thornleigh, and in the junior comp a mixed Normanhurst /Warrawee team. We hope to expand on this next season, but we will have to wait and see.

Our amazingly talented senior Healy team made it to the Grand Finals against Castle Hill, but despite finishing on top of the ladder, were beaten by Castle Hill on Finals day. The team played with grit and determination, though unfortunately were unable to beat their opposition on the day. The senior Perry girls came 3rd overall.

Earlier in the year Danielle Chivers played in the Armidale country carnival and became the first girl to take 5 wickets in an innings in the history of the 29-year-old Carnival. Next season we will explore additional opportunities for more girls to participate in these opportunities.

A big thank you to Anthony Hale for taking the initiative to establish a Senior Girls team to play in the Mixed Saturday morning competition. The aim being to further develop their cricketing skills and exposure to cricket at the next level with (mainly) boys in the same age group. Unfortunately they were unable to form a whole team, but a number of keen and capable players were able to assist another local team, Glenorie, where they very quickly made a great first impression. This team would have been unable to field a team without the girls' assistance, and it also meant that teams avoided the bye in this age group. From Round 6 this team became a force to be reckoned with, with the injection of Amy, Tuvini and Esha - 3 classy cricketing girls from West Penno's women's league. And 'boy' did they make a difference. Tuvini showed her skills with bat and ball. Esha proved reliable behind the stumps but Amy's bowling debut was the stuff of which legends are made as she proceeded to take 4 Kissing Point wickets for just 6 runs - including rolling 4 batsmen for a duck. What a debut! Kudos to Matt Zillman and our friends in District and WPH for arranging for the girls to play for Glenorie. Ellen joined them from Round 7 impressing everyone with a fine caught and bowled in her debut game.

We are very proud and grateful to all the WPHCCC players who have returned to coach younger players; Christina, Minoli, and Dani. Your mentoring, skills and dedication have been invaluable. Earlier this year the Club's executive met to discuss how we could encourage more involvement from females in the club; a talented, energetic and valuable untapped resource we'd like to harness. A number of initiatives were discussed and the idea that senior players and/or mums could coach some teams was one avenue (at which ever level they feel comfortable). We would encourage <u>any</u> volunteers, in particular mums and senior players to assist us with this. The Club would happily support with training if/as required. Please send us an email if this is an opportunity you'd like to take up.

This year we welcomed Kirsty Newbury as our Clubs' Compliance Officer to ensure that as a club we remain at the forefront of child protection and safety matters. We look forward to working with her again next year.

Seven girls took up the opportunity to participate in Academy training with the club's coach Harrison. Their skill development and confidence grew throughout the season. We envisage even more girls taking up this unique club opportunity in the future. Harrison (and his team) also came to the girl's regular training sessions on Tuesday nights at John Purchase Oval to provide additional drills and skills training. It is our hope that next season we could implement this earlier so that they can benefit from the input of these sessions for a longer period of time during the season.

Participation over Results is the club's mantra and we tried our very best to reinforce this to the coaches, managers and girls by rotating batting, bowling, captainship and other opportunities. We feel that this approach helps solidify team spirit and reinforce that everyone has a contribution to make that is valued. Each girl rose to the occasion with respect and responsibility, developing their leadership skills along the way. We will continue to uphold this ethos into next season. We look forward to seeing familiar faces and welcome any new ones who come along.

Girls Only Master Blasters, fills the gap for girls wanting to move to the next level up from Kanga, but who aren't yet ready for the challenges of hard ball cricket. ARMIDALE COUNTRY CARNIVAL


